



Sedgwick County Conservation District 2018 Annual Meeting Minutes

The 73rd Annual Meeting of the Sedgwick County Conservation District was held February 21, 2018 at the Sedgwick County Extension Education Center in Wichita, Kansas.

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 pm with a welcome from Chairperson Doug Kohls. Vice-Chairperson Josh Patterson then described the work of the Conservation District.

Copies of the 2017 Annual Meeting Minutes, Financial Report, District Accomplishments, and District Activities for the year 2017 were provided to all attendees and discussed briefly by Chairperson Kohls. Supervisor Steve Hermann moved to approve the Minutes, Financial Statement and Reports. Treasurer Virgil Hill seconded. Motion carried.

Advisor Greg Winterscheidt conducted the election of two Supervisors. Doug Kohls and Larry Kincheloe were elected Supervisors by secret ballot: Kohls 30 votes and Kincheloe 35 votes.

After Dinner, the Conservation Awards were presented. Bill and June Pracht received a 2017 Conservation Award. Ned and Lisa Renner received a Conservation Award as well as a Wildlife Conservation Award for work done on their farm.

Chairperson Doug Kohls introduced the Board Supervisors and Advisors, District Manager, District Secretary, NRCS staff, and the Sedgwick County Extension Ag Agent. The meeting sponsors were also recognized at this time and thanked for their support of conservation of resources.

The evening concluded with drawings for door prizes.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:45 pm.

Activities

The Sedgwick County Conservation District Board of Supervisors takes seriously their role as conservation leaders for the community. Board members' roles include: meeting monthly to review and approve Conservation Compliance Plans and Resource Management Plans, conducting business in accordance with the mandates set forth in the Conservation District Law, and assisting our District Manager.

The Conservation District staff participated in continuing education opportunities throughout the year to be able to offer a high level of service to the population within the Conservation District's boundaries. Those activities included Division of Conservation and Kansas Association of Conservation Districts workshops as well as individualized training from the Metropolitan Area Building & Construction Department.

New District Manager

We wish Rosemary Renner-Kessinger well in her retirement and thank her for her many years of service to the Conservation District.

Catherine Johnson started as the new District Manager on July 1, 2018. She was a high school math teacher in Wichita for 9 years before earning her Master of Science in Environmental Studies degree from Friends University. Her culminating project for her Environmental Studies degree was to organize an off-the-grid concert and eco festival at the Bartlett Arboretum in Belle Plaine, KS. In October 2018, Sedgwick County and Sumner County Conservation Districts partnered to have an informative booth at the 5th Annual EcoFest.

Non-Point Source (NPS) and Water Resources (WR) Cost-Share

The Sedgwick County Conservation District received \$10,650.00 from the State Division of Conservation to be used for NPS and \$14,275.50 for WR cost share during the 2018 program year. Funds from this program aided landowners at the local level to improve or protect water quality, reduce soil erosion, and enhance water supplies.

The Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) continues to assist the Conservation District in designing practices that are built through the Water Resources Program. Onsite waste systems are the exception to the requirement for NRCS built "Standards and Specifications." Metropolitan Area Building & Construction Department (MABCD) permits and inspects onsite waste systems in Sedgwick County.

On-Site Waste Water System Repair Program Is your septic system failing?

Septic system repair/replacement is expensive.

There is state cost-share money available through the Sedgwick County Conservation District to help with these projects.

- •Cost-share is for upgrading an existing failing system and is not available for new home construction.
